Interviewed

The Faculty of Nursing oversees nine Centers for Excellence in Nursing Research founded in 2013. One of the Centers for Excellence is the Center for Quality Development in Nursing Education and Innovation. Dr. Sombat Skulphan is an Assistant Professor at the Faculty of Nursing, Chiang Mai University and the Chair of the Center for Quality Development in Nursing Education and Innovation. He was recently interviewed to find out more about the Center for Quality Development in Nursing Education and Innovation.

Please describe your role at the Center for Quality Development in Nursing Education and Innovation.

I am the Chair of the Center for Quality Development in Nursing Education and Innovation. I oversee all of the research endeavors at the center.

What is the purpose of the Center for Quality Development in Nursing Education and Innovation? Currently, we are promoting learning and teaching methods to upgrade quality standards, conducting research about learning and teaching, and knowledge management.

What are some of the recent initiatives of the Center for Quality Development in Nursing Education and Innovation?

At the Center for Quality Development in Nursing Education and Innovation, we are working on research project proposals. We are working on three projects at the moment, but hope to start more soon. 21st Century skills is something we have been working on with the faculty. We are finding the students have the skills, but some faculty do not. So we are conducting surveys to find the skill level of the teachers and then working to increase their skills to keep up with the ever-changing world of technology.



How long have you been the chair of the Center for Quality Development in Nursing Education and Innovation?

I have been the chair for two years, there are four years in each term. I have worked at the Faculty of Nursing for 19 years.

What has been your most rewarding experience in your time with FON and the Center for Quality Development in Nursing Education and Innovation thus far?

The highlight of my time with FON and the Center for Quality Development in Nursing Education and Innovation thus far was receiving a certificate of Online Learning from Chiang Mai University in 2017. I was honored to receive this certificate from the interim president of Chiang Mai University. Another rewarding experience has been creating the program, "Science and Art for Happiness Creation". I have been invited by many to share this wisdom over the past few years.

Do you have additional information about the Center for Quality Development in Nursing Education and Innovation that you would like to share?

We are working on many things to improve the quality of the center and feel that we will be able to reach all of our goals. Though the Center for Quality Development in Nursing Education and Innovation research is currently a small project, we are working hard to start new projects. Currently, we are focusing on collaborations with other institutes in Thailand. We have started lunchtime activity groups to give teachers resources they may not have otherwise. Each group meeting presents new technology information. We meet one to two times a month.

Hand in Hand Creating Tomorrow:

Nursing Practice, Education and Research





The Faculty of Nursing, Chiang Mai University was one of the co-organizers for the 7th Hong Kong International Nursing Forum that was held on 18 – 19 December 2017 at the School of Nursing, University of Hong Kong (HKU). The theme was **"Hand in Hand Creating Tomorrow: Nursing Practice, Education and Research"**. This forum was one of the celebratory events of the University of Hong Kong Li Ka Shing Medical Faculty's 130 Years of Medicine in Hong Kong. It was a tremendous success with over 500 delegates from 14 countries and regions attending and supporting the forum along with 35 co-organizers. In attendance were Dean Wipada Kunaviktikul along with four other faculty members: Instructor Siriluck Vadtanapong, and Assistant Dean for Administration and Special Affairs; Dr. Jutarat Mesukko,

Assistant Dean for International Relations; Dr. Chanchai Yothayai, Assistant Dean for Student Development and Alumni Affairs; and Dr. Nonglak Chaloumsuk, Assistant Dean for Quality Improvement. It was a great opportunity to meet other nursing professionals from different countries and cultures to share experiences and to start planting seeds for future collaborations with a focus on nursing practice, education, and research. As nursing enters an age of digital advances, it is ever-important to work together to move forward hand in hand.

During the opening ceremony of the 7th Hong Kong International Nursing Forum, a signing ceremony was held by the School of Nursing for the Memorandum of Agreement (MoA) between the members of the Southeast and East Asian Nursing Education and Research Network (SEANERN). The MoA outlines the framework of cooperation in nursing education and research in the 10 Southeast and 3 East Asian countries and 1 region. In addition, a brief update SEANERN meeting was graciously hosted by the Head of the School of Nursing Professor Dr. Chia-Chin Lin with the SEANERN Chair, Dean Wipada Kunaviktikul.

Interview Questions

1. Please describe your role at the Faculty of Nursing I see myself as a facilitator of learning for faculty and students as well as teaching.

2. What has been your most rewarding experience in your time with FON CMU thus far?

Hard to pinpoint one! The nurturing relationship that the faculty has towards its students and community is inspirational. Post graduate students are so lucky to be studying in such a rich environment with experienced Thai faculty and opportunities to mix with peers from all over the world. I love to trace the journeys that the PhD students take after graduating from Chiang Mai University to become leaders in their own countries.

3. Where are you from/where do you call home?

Difficult question! I was born in the north of England. We have always moved around a lot and I went to nine schools before I was ten years old. I spent three years in Malaysia as a child and I think that laid the groundwork for my love of Southeast Asia. I set off for Australia after I finished my nursing qualifications but got side tracked and worked in Hong Kong for a year. I finally moved to Australia in 1987 and that seems like home but then so does the UK and Thailand and Japan.

4. What foreign universities have you worked for/ will work for and when?

I have spent a lot of my career in clinical and health service management and was rather late going into academia. I have worked at the University of Newcastle and University of New England in Australia, Yamaguchi University in Japan and Wuhan University in China.

5. What draws you to international work?

The people! The culture! The opportunity to meet and learn from people from other contexts. I never tire of learning about culture. My passion outside of work is textiles and I love exploring markets and meeting craftspeople.

6. What are some of the challenges of international work?

Well in my old age I seem to find it impossible to pick up new languages although I have gotten pretty good at understanding Japanese. It really does bring home to me just how hard it is for researchers to publish in a second language. Thanks to the internet, isolation from family is not the big problem it once was. When I first worked in Australia I was working in remote Aboriginal areas and there were no phones and a weekly mail plane. That was isolation.

7. What can Thailand learn from other countries and their research methods/practices?

It is tough to be a researcher in Thailand – maybe everywhere – because there are so many competing demands on time. Finding time to devote entirely to research is difficult.

I would urge Thai nurses to pay attention to the process as well as the outcome of their research: ensure that research studies are well designed and thoroughly peer reviewed at the beginning of the research process.

8. What can other countries learn from Thailand and the research methods here?

I think other countries have a lot to learn from Thailand's engagement in the community. This leads to rich research and collaboration between clinical and academic nurses as well as the general public. Academics in Chiang Mai are clinically current and have credibility with their clinical colleagues. Some countries do not value clinical experience and that is a great shame: in my view you cannot be an effective educator or researcher without this experience.

Thai nurses also seem to be working in occupational health areas that other nurses have not considered – such as implementing farm safety programs, road safety, chemical awareness programs for hairdressers. These are programs that really make a difference to the health of the community.

9. What would you say most motivates you to do what you do? What are you most excited or passionate about?

Facilitating learning is what I am most passionate about; engaging people to think critically and bring creativity to their clinical and research work and to always have patients' interests as their first priority.


Mental health care needs urgent attention in most countries and there is stigma and fear about people with mental health problems even by nurses. I hope that I can transform nurses' attitudes about this and through them improve the conditions in their countries.

10. What's next for you in your work? What are you looking forward to?

I would be very happy to keep working in this capacity for the foreseeable future. I am also looking forward to a time when there is less emphasis on the quantity of publications and more value put on quality and the translation of research into improvements in clinical practice and teaching environments.



Research Profile



Prof. Dr. Susanha Yimyam, DirectoroftheCenterofExcellence in Nursing was recently awarded the "Outstanding Nursing Award in Research and Innovation" from The Nurses' Association of Thailand. She has become nationally and internationally recognized for her expertise in women's sexual health and breastfeeding. In addition, her creativity in developing unique teaching tools and methods for delivering interventions has made her well-recognized for her contributions to nursing research.

Her breastfeeding and sexual reproductive health work has focused primarily on vulnerable populations. She has worked with workers from the informal work sector, migrant workers, underserved ethnic groups, as well as youth and teenagers. She studied and confirmed the efficacy of Thai herbal medicine to stimulate breastfeeding. Based on her findings, she has partnered with a local business to create a breastfeeding herbal tea line based on traditional recipes to commercially manufacture these teas and the Plee Preme tea line has become very successful - winning four awards in Thailand and six awards internationally.

She has also received several awards for excellence in teaching in recognition for her innovative teaching tools. Some examples include an apparatus in which students can use to practice conducting vaginal exams and a specialized apron for teaching breastfeeding that integrates high-fidelity aspects such as producing simulated breastmilk. To better engage students she developed an interactive breastfeeding e-book for students in the Thai undergraduate program.

She has been a Principal Investigator (PI) on 24 research projects and Co-Principal Investigator on an additional 30 research projects. Currently she is the PI for two studies – one on Helping Nursing Professionals to provide Breastfeeding support to teen mothers and the other on developing an updated version of her breastfeeding e-book for international students. This version of the e-book will integrate multimedia. As a Co-PI, she is researching the sexual health of older people.

Birth Across Borders:

Improving Infant and Maternal Mortality in Myanmar

The Faculty of Nursing is working with Ulster University in Northern Ireland on the Birth Across Borders Project funded by the Global Research Challenges Fund of the Research Councils UK. This project is a collaboration between Northern Ireland, Thailand, and Myanmar to address maternal mortality. Dr. Lesley Dornan from Ulster University is leading project activities in Southeast Asia and is working closely with Dr. Nonglak Chaloumsuk and Prof. Dr. Susanha Yimyam from the Faculty of Nursing. The UK research team from Ulster University also includes Professor George Kernohan, Principal Investigator, and Professor Marlene Sinclair a Midwifery specialist; both of whom have many years of experience in this area.

This study is building upon the formative phase of the project which took place from February - April 2017. This phase focused on comparing the differences in maternal policy and practices in Thailand and Myanmar and exploring the effect of universal healthcare coverage on maternal care in Thailand. The formative phase also centered on identifying resources and expertise to build capacity for maternal health in

Myanmar. FON was identified as an important partner for Phase II given the Faculty's expertise in maternal issues and 'Thailand's success in dramatically reducing its maternal mortality rate in a relatively short amount of time.

Phase II is a six-month mixed-methods pilot project to identify maternal mortality risk factors in conflict settings. The team is currently designing a framework for working in conflict countries and a 54-item survey and focus group guide. The pilot project will take place in Karen State in Eastern Myanmar. Karen State was chosen because of the identified need for better maternal health services and the existence of key partners that can assist with project implementation. Karen state is very rural and people often have to walk between one to six days to access healthcare facilities, which often have limited supplies. The Karen Department of Health and Welfare gave permission for the study to take place in the Karen State as they are looking to establish local area clinics and study data will provide important information in guiding their process.



The quantitative study is collecting information on the context of maternal health such as maternal healthcare, barriers to healthcare access, community strengths and functions, and basic issues that mothers face on a daily basis. The focus groups will capture women's lived experiences of birth and maternal health. Women will discuss their experiences of pregnancy, labor, delivery, and the early postpartum period. In total, 16 communities in Karen State will participate with a goal of collecting 260 surveys and conducting 8-10 focus groups. The Karen Department of Health and Welfare will assist with identifying participants. The data collection will be conducted by local development groups, Earth Mission Asia and Partners Relief and Development. Drs. Dornan and Chaloumsuk traveled to Myanmar in February 2018 to meet with local partners and to prepare for data collection training.

Data from this pilot project will be used to apply for funding for a two-year project that will scale up project activities across Myanmar. The government of Myanmar is in the process of reforming its healthcare system and they are considering universal coverage similar to Thailand. The Ministry of Health and Sports recently approved a nationwide Birth Across Borders project focusing on the five main ethnic groups in Myanmar: Burmans, Mon, Kachin, Karen and Shan.

Myanmar has experienced conflict for decades. As a result, many parts of the county are impoverished and the government has a difficult time providing healthcare in remote areas. In 2015, WHO documented that Myanmar had 178 maternal deaths per 100,000 live births. This is well above the Sustainable Development Goal of less than 70 maternal deaths per 100,000. Hopefully the Birth Across Borders project will identify key elements that will improve maternal health Myanmar and assist the government in improving health care for all in Myanmar.

A portable Neck Support which was based on my group project from my third-year Design Innovation class.

I had attended my first International Conference at Assumption University when I was a second-year nursing student so I was already familiar as an observer.

For Innovation class, we needed to present our group project to all the third-year nursing students including the Thai program and International program as well as to all the advisers of each group. For the conference I had to summarize my Innovation report to an abstract and give a presentation about it in English. I was able to get help from my teachers when I was preparing for the conference.


